"But forget all that – it is nothing compared to what I am going to do.

For I am about to do something new. See I have already begun!

Do you not see it? I will make a pathway through the wilderness.

I will create rivers in the dry wasteland."

—Isaiah 43:18—19. New Living Translation

The above was said by God as a promise to the Israelites as they waited for 150 years for things in their lives to change. The Babylonians in 586 B.C. invaded Jerusalem and not only destroyed the Temple but totally annihilated Jerusalem. In the writings of Josephus, he writes that Jerusalem was so destroyed that the Babylonians even plowed up the street, leaving nothing uncovered that they had not destroyed. Through Isaiah, God was reminding the Israelites of how God rescued them from Egypt in the past. But God was also saying the Exodus event was nothing compared to what God was getting ready to do among them.

Christians celebrate Easter in the Spring for a reason. It is the time when the created world around us begins to change. What at one time seemed to be dead not only comes alive, but new growth happens, and life is restored and resurrected. We usually do not think of Easter as a time to celebrate our blessings – we hold that for Thanksgiving. However, Easter should be a time of celebrating new life and growth, as well – especially from the times when we thought nothing good would ever come from this again. Like the Israelites, the church has been there too – with COVID and disaffiliation seemingly happening simultaneously. With both, we lost friends and loved ones. In short, we have been in the wilderness for a few years, thinking that not only was our past greater than our future, but we were not even sure if we had a future. We were not sure where or how we were going to move forward, much less get to a Promised Land.

Church, God is doing a new thing among us! So, celebrate this Easter with the signs of not only growth, but resurrection happening at Sedge Garden UMC. First, there are many signs of God working. There are also affirmations that we are heading in the right direction toward what God has always promised us. And those promises are being fulfilled. As we, like the Israelites, remain obedient and faithful in taking the steps God is leading us in. Not because we know all the details, but because we believe in God's promises despite what has been or even what we can only see or believe in.

A resurrection and renewal are happening at Sedge Garden UMC! This is the direction we are being led by God to take. First, our average attendance for 2024 was 160 for both services. This is up significantly from previous years, but so far 2025 is incredible! Our online views have gone from an average of 353 views to 753 views each week. So far this year, 3,703 people have watched our First Fruits Service, and 4,583 people have watched the Traditional Service. In addition, our average Sedge Garden Kids are 15 children; and there are 15 youth each week. However, the exciting news is that this year there are 10 Confirmands within that group. Also exciting is the fact that the Preschool enrollment is up and pre-enrollment for both the Summer and Fall classes are also up. In fact, most classes are filling up quickly or are already full. Meaning – unlike the Israelites – we are not going to have a generational gap. We are passing on the promises to the next generation. And to make sure of that promise, we have started having Chapel Time with the preschool, as well.

At Sedge Garden UMC, we are not stopping just to smell the daisies. New ministries are flourishing and helping resurrect and renew the church, as well. The Bus Ministry is now rolling along (pun intended). We are picking up residents from Arbor Ridge and soon we will be going to Kerner Ridge. In addition, many of the homebound are receiving monthly Holy Communion as volunteers are going out and ministering to them. Coffee Connections have started to help bring all generations together so not only can relationships be built, but stories of life experiences can be shared, and traditions can be passed down.

There is so much more that is happening and coming in the future. God is blessing us, but also preparing us for not only a revival, but a new resurrected life. Let us all come together and celebrate for God is doing a new thing and a new life has begun at Sedge Garden UMC – and it begins in each one of us.



Bryan Staley 5091 Oak Garden Drive Kernersville, NC 27284 (DOB: 1.8.1949) Age: 76 Member since 1986 (39 years)

One of the nicest men ever in our church family is Bryan Staley. Among his many years with the Methodist Men, Bryan represents the best in everything Boy Scout related, having sponsored 35 Eagle Scouts over his 66 years with the scouts. As a scout, Bryan has completed 1,800 miles of the 2,200 miles of the Appalachian Trail. Bryan recalls his favorite memory hiking "while a Boy Scout in Troop 307 in Greensboro: during a Patrol Leaders Council Meeting, our Scoutmaster, George Stentz, told us about the Francis Asbury Trail in the Great Smokey Mountain National Park. Francis Asbury, a Methodist Circuit Rider, used this trail to serve his churches. There was talk that we may hike that trail, but it never happened. During my service as Scoutmaster, our District in the General Greene Council sponsored a backpacking trek in October 1976 on the Asbury Trail. A few Scouts in the troop were interested, so



we attended and had a good time. We decided to hike a section of the Appalachian Trail in 1977 and continued annually. It was all memorable. Hump Mountain in NC, a fantastic view as we approached it. On June 24, 1977, as we approached Locust Ridge lean-to, we noticed a lot of treetops that had snapped. Some Wilderness Trail Ministry hikers from SGUMC arrived at the lean-to after we did. Bob White was one of them. They went down to an area below the shelter to camp. Later in the evening a strong thunderstorm with high wind came through. A few of the girls in the group came up to the shelter to wait it out."


Bryan grew up in Greensboro, NC, and attended Gillespie Park from first grade to ninth. He played a baritone from 3rd to 9th grade. After moving, he attended Southeast High School in Guilford County, where he played a tuba and was a school bus driver. Bryan majored in Civil Engineering at NC State University in Raleigh. There he played a tuba in the concert band and a sousaphone in the marching band and joined Alpha Phi Omega fraternity, a national service fraternity. The purpose of the fraternity is "to assemble college students in a National Service Fraternity in the fellowship of principles derived from the Scout Oath and Scout Law of the BSA."

Bryan married his love, Margaret, at Core Creek Methodist Church in Beaufort, NC, on December 27, 1970. They have two children, Chris Staley (step-son) and Brittany Baynes, and five grandchildren. After college, he was employed with the NC State Highway Department Division 9 as an Assistant District Engineer. Next he became the Forsyth County Division 9 Maintenance Supervisor. Then he became the Division 9 Assistant Traffic Engineer. After taking a couple of tests in Raleigh, he became a Professional Engineer (PE). Afterwards, until retirement, Bryan was the Division 9 Traffic Engineer. Because he liked working there, he worked part-time about 9 years after retiring with employees who previously worked for him.

When asked what his most treasured accolade he ever received was, Bryan stated two: "First, when Doug Watts presented him with the Methodist Church Cross and Flame Award, and secondly, when the Scout Hut was named in his honor."

Bryan's philosophy of life is "The Lord, my God." Bryan's response to what he loves most about your church: he remarked, "Being able to watch the traditional service on YouTube and seeing everyone." Bryan misses no longer being able to talk on the phone or attend church in person. Send him a card and say hello. He would love to hear from his dear friends.


