And yet, God always creates out of chaos. Out of chaos, God created the heavens and the earth. Out of chaos, the Holy Spirit came and the church was born.

So why do we often believe that chaos is so bad? Why can we not see that even in this present moment, God is creating something more? Out of the chaos in our lives, God is creating something more than was there before. When there is chaos in your life, trust that God is creating more than you can see or even comprehend in order for you to be the very child that God created you to be.

Hugh grew up in North Carolina and attended NC State University. His degree was in Industrial

Engineering. His work was much more related to mechanical engineering and he had to learn as he went from job to job. "In his day" his favorite hobby was golfing, but his most endearing activity was being a gardener and father to three children: Carol, Hughie, and Candy. When asked what his most rewarding contribution to our church was, he stated "the establishment of our Preschool program 55 years ago." Hugh was a key player on the Administrative Board at the time of the preschool's inception.

Hugh and his wife Willie have been together 65 years. Hugh visits with "his Willie" daily in the nursing facility at River Landing. Hugh still drives and keeps up with NCSU football and basketball. 




